



Today is the Second Sunday of Advent and our first reading is from the Prophet Baruch, a scribe of Jeremiah. The setting is the Babylonian Exile when the Israelites were taken from

Israel to Babylon. Notice that the author speaks of Jerusalem being in "mourning and misery," because its inhabitants are not there. Baruch writes to give them hope. Because the people understood that God would protect them from their enemies, they face a great crisis of faith, and Baruch assures them that they will return and that God has not forgotten them.

Our second reading comes from Paul's letter to the Philippians and again, our theme is hope. Paul is imprisoned but his letter is filled with hope. Why? Because God "who began the good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus." Like Baruch, Paul does not let his suffering lessen his confidence that God is and will remain faithful.

Our gospel begins the story of Jesus' public ministry by placing Jesus within the political and religious setting of his day. As the Jesus story will unfold, many of these political and religious figures will try to get to him. For example, Herod will kill John the Baptist and would love to kill Jesus. The high priest, Caiaphas, will be head of the Sanhedrin which will condemn Jesus. But none of these obstacles will be able to prevent Jesus from doing what he came to accomplish. Next, Luke introduces John the Baptist who will prepare the way for Jesus by calling people to a baptism of repentance. In describing Jesus, Luke quotes Isaiah "Every valley shall be filled and every mountain and hill shall be made low." These words are known as Second Isaiah and takes place again during the Babylonian Exile. Like Baruch, he assures the people that God has not abandoned them.

It is extremely difficult for us to get into the spirit of Advent with all of the commercial emphasis on Christmas. We try to hold off on our Christmas jubilation and use these days as a time of longing, of waiting for the coming promise. But we are so surrounded by Christmas music, gift buying, etc. that it's tough for us to try to stay in the Advent mode. By the time we start to sing the Christmas carols on Christmas, we're actually tired of them because we've been hearing them since Thanksgiving.

A reminder of our Christmas schedule. There will be a 4:30 PM Christmas Eve Mass at St. Hedwig's and a 5 PM and a 9 PM at St. Patrick's. On Christmas Day, there is a 9 AM at St. Hedwig's and a 10:30 AM at St. Patrick's.

The parish office will close at noon on Christmas Eve and not reopen until the day after New Year's. I will be here in case of emergencies or funerals. You can also reach me at home at 454-4032.

We're continuing to be ahead of schedule with the church and I'm growing in my optimism that we will be able to return to church for the weekend of December 22 & 23. This will not only make our transition much easier but it will give the parish an opportunity to see the restoration without all of the hoopla that will be part of the Christmas Eve 5 PM Mass.

The marble flooring in the sanctuary is being laid and is absolutely beautiful. It is bordered with a green marble as well as a section of green marble underneath the altar. One change that will have to come because of this new flooring is that we won't be able to use the church for things like concerts or passion plays, etc. because the altar will no longer be able to be moved. It will have to stay where it is. Because of its weight, moving it could crack the marble tiles.

We've also removed the handicap access that has been in front of the Blessed Mother altar because there is another handicap access into the weekday chapel and anyone can simply come through the doors from the chapel into the main sanctuary.

We're now down to the finishing touches such as clean up, faux painting the radiator covers to look like marble, etc. The floor in the southwest tower was sagging two inches in the center and has now been stabilized. Large sections of the marble wall in there had cracked or broken because of the way the tower is settling and those have been replaced and are being faux painted to appear to match the marble that is already there.

We have also purchased a large carpet for the vestibule that should absorb much of the salt, snow, etc. that gets dragged in during the winter to hopefully save the aisle carpets.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

Cardinal Sean O'Malley, the archbishop of Boston closed 55 parishes 5 years ago and just recently announced that he is downsizing even more from the present 288 parishes into 135 cluster parishes. One fifth of the archdiocese's 420 priests are 65 or older, and the church expects its number of active priests to fall under 200 in less than 10 years! The clusters will consist of four parishes, each of which will retain its legal identity, be run by one priest and merged staff and councils. At the present time, 4 out of 10 Boston parishes cannot pay their bills and Mass attendance is at an all time low of 16%.

I think what they forget is that each parish has its own unique personality and to try to impose one parish council on 4 different personalities won't work. I know just working with the two parishes I have that they are each different and unique and each needs its own Finance & Parish Council. The Finance Council of St. Hedwig's wouldn't be interested in the finances of St. Patrick's and vice versa. Once you start to tamper with the unique personality of a parish, you run the risk of destroying it. Besides, asking one priest to staff 4 parishes is insane. We keep trying to solve all of these problems by going around the real issues that need to be addressed. We're starting to deny people the sacraments and access to a priest. Why can't we pull back, study what the causes of all of this are and then act upon the causes rather than acting on the results. Why are there so few vocations, why are people not going to Church? These approaches are not going to solve things.
